


For example, you might need to talk to an expert on the subject you're writing on, a resident of a place where your book is set, or a person whose experiences are similar to one of your characters. Whoever you talk to, you're likely to gain truly valuable first-hand information and insight, so get chatting!



In Anna at War, Daniel only learns about his grandmother's extraordinary wartime story because he takes the time to ask her about it. Older people in our lives often have interesting stories to tell about their pasts, but often we don't hear these stories because we don't ask.

What's your funniest moment?

Now would be a great time to have a chat with an older person you know and take some time to ask them about their life. You can do it face to face if you live in the same house, or on Skype, Facetime or even an old-fashioned phone call if you can't meet them in person at the moment. Some things you might want to ask about:



Places they've lived, their favourite and least favourite


Places they've travelled to, and any terrible or wonderful travel experiences

their memories of their childhood, their parents and siblings, their schooldays

their scariest moments, happiest moments and funniest moments

There will probably be other things to talk about, and some of their answers might lead to you asking more about particular things. You may find that one of your questions brings up a really strong memory and you might end up talking in detail about that instead of going through all the questions.





